
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Notes From The Editor

Nepalese Women Have Made Many Achievements Since Promulgation Of New Constitution: Foreign Minister Dr. Rana

Foreign Minister Dr. Arzu Rana Deuba underlined the achievements made by Nepali women since the promulgation of the Constitution of Nepal in 2015. She highlighted the success of Nepali women to reach to the top positions as the head of state, chief justice and the speaker of the parliament in a matter of few years.

She also added that the participation of women in public life, such as civil service, security forces and public sector employment opportunities has also increased significantly. Foreign Minister Dr. Rana stressed the need of the 'whole of' approach to attain gender equality, to protect and uphold a girl from her womb to her tombwith the support of untiring leadership and fearless efforts.

She also highlighted the statistical evidencefrom around the world demonstrating persistent challenges faced by women to reach to the leadership position and attain general and sustained empowerment.She underlined the need to build a strong coalition at local, national as well as global level and move forward to ensure women's dignified position in the world.

Minister for Foreign Affairs Dr. Rana participated in the Women Foreign Ministers'Meeting hosted by Mélanie Joly, Foreign Minister of Canada and the Kamina Johnson Smith, Minister of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade of Jamaica in Toronto on 19-20 September 2024.

The meeting was held in two sessions: Women in Public Spaces: Politics, Leadership and Governance; and Women Leaders in the Age of Disinformation.

During the second session, Foreign Minister Dr. Deuba em-

phasized the importance of digital technology and tools for women leaders to directly reach out to their constituencies, to raise awareness and spread positive message towards women leadership.

She also highlighted the flip side of the digital technology widely used to spread hate, targeted harassment, and disinformation to discourage women from rising in public offices and business. She said that the leadership in developed countries could play an important role to secure technological and financial support to developing countries to bridge the divide, as well as to rein-in the negative by-products of digital technologies for the betterment of society.

The Women Foreign Ministers' Meeting concluded with a Co-Chairs' Statement that acknowledges the doubling of women's political representation across the world in past 25 years and reaffirms commitment to break down barriers and empower the next generation of women leaders.

The Statement pledges to advance women's participation in leadership and decision-making and support safe and inclusive spaces for women in politics and public life. The Meeting also pledges to intentionally encourage young women across the world to enter politics and public life.

The statement expresses concerns with the growing hate and misogynistic discourse found online targeting women, particularly in civic

spaces and agreed to address online gender-based violence and prevent gendered disinformation and call on online platforms to take action and increase their accountability.



During the Meet-

ing, Foreign Minister Dr. Deuba was accompanied by Ambassador of Nepal to Canada, Bharat Raj Paudyal and other members of her delegation.

On the sidelines of the Women Foreign Ministers' Meeting, Foreign Minister Dr. Rana had a bilateral meeting with the Foreign Minister of Romania Luminita-TeodoraOdobescu.

The two Foreign Ministers exchanged views on further strengthening and expanding mutually beneficial relations between the two countries. They also discussed about the ways to expedite establishing diplomatic representation in each others country and promoting welfare and interests of Nepali migrant workers in Romania.

Later today, Foreign Minister Dr. Rana received a delegation of Nepali entrepreneurs based in Toronto and discussed the issues related to promoting export of Nepali agricultural and cottage industry produces to Canada as well as other matters of interests to the Nepali diaspora community and students.

Separately, Foreign Minister also received insights from the community leader and NRNA representatives on the challenges of Nepali young students that jump immediately after completion of + two education in Nepal to study abroad without adequate preparation and sufficient understanding of the courses, prospects and employability.


KOICA Opens Door For Mugu People To Get Easy Health Access At Nepal Korea Friendship Municipality Hospital

SAARC's Third Technical Meeting of Senior Official of Education Convened in Bangkok

The Third Technical Meeting of SAARC Senior Officials of Education was held on September 12, 2024, in Bangkok, Thailand, on the sidelines of the Asia Pacific Meeting on Education (APMED6). This important event marked eight

years since

the launch of the SAARC Framework for Action for Education 2030 and was organized by the SAARC Secretariat with technical and logistical support from the



UNESCO Regional Office in New Delhi and the UNICEF Regional Office in Kathmandu.

The Meeting was attended by representatives from seven SAARC member states of Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka, alongside the Regional Director of UNESCO and the Representative of UNICEF. The session was chaired by Minister of State for

Higher Education Mr. Ahmed Shafeeu from the esteemed Government of Maldives, with Ms. IroshaCooray, Director at the SAARC Secretariat, formally opening the meeting in accordance with SAARC protocol.

The gathering served as a vital forum for reviewing and assessing the progress of the SAARC Framework for Action for Education 2030. The discussions highlighted both advancements and challenges within the region, establishing some recommendations for future actions aimed at improving educational outcomes across South Asia.

Key outcomes and recommendations from the meeting included a strategic focus on integrating climate change adaptation into the SAARC agenda and advocating for increased funding and resources to strengthen SAARC's role as a South-South Cooperation Platform. The meeting emphasized leveraging SAARC as a knowledge management forum to share best practices in teacher professional development, learning assessment, and SDG 4 data. Additionally, a regional program/framework was proposed to tackle the learning crisis by enhancing learning assessment capabilities. The meeting also highlighted the need to improve educational access for children, especially girls, and to promote STEM education and Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET). Other recommendations included assessing and improving teacher competencies and fostering public-private partnerships to advance education access and outcomes.

Two Books By Sudhir Sharma Released

Two books by journalist and writer Sudhir Sharma have been released. The two books titled 'Monk Trade and Rebellion: Nepal's Vote-China Relations and India' and 'Himalapariko Huri: Changed Nepal-China Relations after the Republic' were released.

Sharma's two books were released during a program in Kathmandu. The book has written about Nepal's relationship with China and Tibet.

Speaking at the book release program, CPN (UML) General Secretary Shankar Pokharel said that Sharma's book



presents the fact that Nepal has had relations with China since ancient times.

He said, "The popular belief that Nepal's foreign relations are dependent on India is not true.

It has been confirmed with facts that since ancient times there has been a relationship with the north in terms of culture, trade, tradition, religion, etc.

Pokharel also commented on Sharma's other book 'Himalpariko Huri: Changed Nepal-China Relations after the Republic'. He said that 'Huri' could not come to Nepal from the other side of the Himalayas. He said, "He named a book Himalpariko Huri. In our socio-cultural and other matters, the time has not come to accept that the wind has blown from the north. Is there a cold wind blowing?"

Culture Of Nepal: Australian Ambassador Leann Johnston

Leann Johnston the new Ambassador of Nepal to Australia, has said that she will work closely with the



Nepalese government on local and international issues.

Johnston, who presented the certificate of status to President Ramchandra Paudel on Thursday (12 September), said that the relation-

ship between Australia and Nepal is strong. Ambassador said that it is a matter of pride to invest in Australia in Nepal.

She mentioned that she was excited to experience Nepal's natural beauty, high and diverse culture and warm hospitality. Leanne Johnston led the mission following the end of the previous Australian ambassador Felicity Volk's term.

"Our relationship is underpinned by a vibrant Nepalese community in Australia. Over 150,000 people of Nepalese heritage call Australia home."

Johnston is a career officer with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade and was most recently Acting Australian High Commissioner in Abuja. She has previously served overseas in Fiji, France, Spain, Afghanistan, Kenya, Sweden, Germany, Türkiye and New Zealand.

She replaced outgoing Ambassador Felicity Volk for her contributions to advancing Australia's interests in Nepal since 2021.

In her message ambassador said that the year 2025 will mark the 65th anniversary of formal diplomatic relations between Australia and Nepal. Since the late 1980s, the friendship between our countries has flourished through formal links such as high-level visits, our Bilateral Consultation Mechanism, an active development assistance program and trade and investment ties. Equally important are our rapidly expanding people to people links.

"Around 180,000 Nepalis have made Australia their home and they are contributing to our countries' close relations, including through growing business connections," said ambassador.

In 2023, Nepal was Australia's second largest trading partner in South Asia, with total bilateral trade of \$4.6 billion, up by around 56 per cent from 2022. Nepal is now in the top 20 export markets for Australia.

Australia provided an estimated \$27.2 million in Official Development Assistance to Nepal in 2023-24, focused on

climate change and governance.

Japan Provides Grant For Reconstruction Of Classrooms For Bheri Tribeni Secondary School In Jajarkot District

KIKUTA Yutaka, Ambassador of Japan to Nepal, signed a grant contract with Deepak Chapagain, President of Volunteer Corps Nepal (VCN), for the reconstruction of a classroom building for Shree Bheri Tribeni Secondary School (SBTSS) in Jajarkot district.

The signing ceremony was held at the Embassy of Japan in Kathmandu today. The project is funded under the Grant Assistance for Grassroots Human Security Projects (GGP) of the Government of Japan and includes a grant of USD 170,159 (approximately NPR 22.7 million).

The project is managed by VCN, which has been active in emergency disaster relief and other sectors since 2018. The final beneficiary, SBTSS, was established in 1985 and serves as a core educational institution for nearly 500 students in Jajarkot and nearby districts.

However, the school is one of the institutions severely affected by the November 2023 earthquake, with its main build-

ing completely collapsed. As part of the community's recovery in the face of post-earthquake challenges, the project will support the reconstruction of a two-story building with 12 classrooms. It is expected that the classrooms built by GGP will pro-



vide a safe and effective educational environment for the students and teachers who are now forced to conduct their activities in the temporary school shelter.

The Embassy of Japan believes that this project will not only improve the educational environment, but also contribute to the development of Nepal including Jajarkot area as one of the symbols of the post-earthquake reconstruction. We also hope that this assistance will further strengthen the friendship between the people of Japan and Nepal, now and for future generations.

GGP was established to implement projects that directly benefit people at the grassroots level for the socio-economic development of communities. Since 1991, over 200 GGP projects have been completed in Nepal.

Let's Modernize And Brand Palpali Dhaka: President Dhakal

Chandra Prasad Dhakal, President of the Federation of Nepalese Industries and Commerce, said that if the Palpali Dhaka industry can be modernized and produced in large quantities, branding can be done in the international market as well through exports.

Inaugurating the 70th Annual General Meeting of Palpa Industry and Commerce Association today, Chairman Dhakal held the opinion that although there are many original products of Nepal that can be promoted in Nepal's export market, the state is lagging behind in marketing them.

President Dhakal said, 'Palpa can sell tourism, but since Palpa's Dhaka and Karuwa have created a national identity, what can be done in branding and marketing of these products, let the businessmen here come and make a plan, we will do what we can.'

President Dhakal also said that the bank interest rate is cheap and the investment environment in the country is becoming more comfortable, so there is no need to back down from investing in products that have made a national identity.

He also said that since Palpa is a well-known place in the country, tourism infrastructure should be built to attract more tourists from home and abroad.



He said, 'Ranimahal in Palpa is a historical heritage and it has a long history of more than a century in Nepal.

The possibility of attracting tourists should be explored by developing it. Tourism activities should be boosted through con-

servation, promotion and publicity of these assets.

Mentioning the fact that even when he was young, the citizens of Baglung used to come to Palpa for everything from health treatment to the local market and said that he also has an emotional connection with Palpa. Accordingly, he said that the current Palpa can also be a leader in market or other activities.

The Government of India grant under 'Nepal-India Development Cooperation' was utilized for the construction of triple storied school building with other facilities for Shree



The Private Sector Can Work Smoothly Only With Policy Stability: President Dhakal

Dhakal said that there is currently high liquidity in the banking system in Nepal and although the interest rate has decreased, the demand for loans from the private sector is low. 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not be attracted.

He said that it is positive that Nepal's political parties have a consensus on economic issues during the amendment of these laws.

He said - "Earlier, we have repeatedly asked the parties to agree on economic issues, that is, the country's economy." Therefore, I think that on the morning of the investment conference, even when eight laws were brought through the ordinance, all parties agreed, and everyone welcomed them.

We have seen that opposition parties protested even when an ordinance was issued earlier. Thus, due to the activism and advocacy of the Federation, all the powers of the country have gradually come to the same issue and the investment environment is also gradually improving.

At present, while visiting the district, President Dhakal said that the country should not only look for foreign investment, but also the capital that is scattered within the country can be consolidated and invested in big investments.

He also informed that Nepal Development Public Limited

Company of 10 billion has been established with the participation of all the private sector in order to collect such capital and invest it in national level.

He said that through this company, even those who do not have enough capital to work



can use it as equity and an environment can be created through this company where the funds scattered all over the country can be united and invested.

Presenting an example of the federation's work in the past one and a half years to create an investment environment in the country and to improve the declining economy, Chairman Dhakal urged everyone to invest and benefit from this time as it is a good time for investment.

Bioregionalism Satsang

As with most activist movements worried about environmental degradation, bioregionalism too rose as a rallying point in the 1970s. Social and environmental activism saw its heyday and stalwarts in the 1980s and 1990s. Unfortunately, its history and effectiveness in the first quarter of the 21st Century has been insipid and disappointing. NGOs in the Global North have been tamed and domesticated to serve official procedural fetishism of SDGs, MDGs and COP platitudes, while their cousins in the Global South are political orphans, having been vilified and marginalized as "anti-developmentalists". In this historical desert, in early September this year, a brave group of old and young environmentalists gathered in Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh, India to share their angst and to see if a new path forward could be forged.

How did this sad state of affairs arise even as global environmental degradation has gotten worse? Why has it not galvanized the younger generation (more of whose future is at stake than those of the oldies) to reverse the decline and come forth with more robust activism that would make a difference? I will speculate about that at the end of this essay, but first some background about the bioregionalism movement.

Political boundaries of nation-states are determined by military history and administrative boundaries therein by convenience of transport and communication. The logic of such boundary definitions often go against nature. Rivers as boundaries – a natural conclusion when armies of both sides find it easier to defend themselves – makes it near impossible to plan or execute irrigation, flood control or other projects in the riparian lands. River basin as a unit of planning or administration makes much sense, mostly to hydrologists but not for the powers-thatbe. The same applies to movements of wildlife, rainfall, information and even people when the nation-state container is assumed to contain ALL social, economic and other activities, every other flow being "foreign".

This has prompted a long history of efforts to find more integrative approaches such as Integrated Water Resources Management (IWRM) and today its new avatar, the nexus, with mixed results. Bioregionalism is an effort by those worried about alarming environmental degradation brought about by human activity to find an alternative path ahead that, unlike conventional environmentalism which is mostly a protest AGAINST current state of affairs, is also FOR something else. This tactic very much matches Global South views where being against something merely leads to being branded as against unquestioned hallowed development itself and thus politically suicidal.

I remember our own history in Nepal. When I was in Berkeley as a Fulbright student in the mid-1980s, I had the good fortune to be a "founding observer" of the International Rivers Network. My problem was that, as a Southern environmentalist intent on returning to Nepal after my studies, I could not accept the Northern NGO slogan of No Dams! I argued (unsuccessfully) for No Bad Dams! It was because, as a then government engineer with the Ministry of Water Resources, the former would have me hooted out in no time, while the latter slogan would remove the binary for-against straitjacket and allow space for debate and possibly improved change. It did: the anti-Arun-3 campaign that ensued allowed activists to successfully argue that the World Bank's proposal to develop the project at roughly five times the market cost was bad economics, that alternatives would give a third more electricity at half the cost and half the time. Ultimately, the campaign managed to see the alternative come to fruition.

The biggest attraction of bioregionalism is its giving co-space to human practices that have co-evolved with the local environment and its constraints to find a more sane lifestyle that differs from the suicidal infinite extractive consumption culture that currently dominates in the name of "progress" and monochrome "development". It begins by accepting unique ecology and cultural attributes of bioregions and proposes re-inhabitation, meaning giving value to that unique space, enriching it not just physically but also culturally, and not seeing it as merely an exchangeable resource to be exploited and left. It means giving value to food that is grown locally appropriate to the hydroclimatic and ecological conditions of the area; using local materials as far as possible in construction and interior décor; using production and services of local people to the maximum and not rendering them jobless migrants having to fulfil labour requirements elsewhere; and most importantly it means giving

primacy to socio-environmental stewardship or custodianship, not exploitative ownership.

All this requires a radical rethinking of governance, indeed representative democracy and the very notion of development itself as well. It is a tall order which the Bhopal Satsang wrestled with it in the South Asian context. In contrast with reductionist analytical approaches, synthesizing holistic ones often get overwhelmed with the plethora of cases and details, in the process missing the forest for the trees. Challenges to bioregionalfrom climate change and biodiversity loss that is leading to greater immiseration of the already poor. It is not an easy task because it entails conceptual and political battles with the entrenched forces of extractive capitalism that externalizes much of the costs to the poor and the environment (and internalizes profits within a narrow circle of 1% elites). It must address that fundamental political-economic problem posed by Karl Polanyi: should not markets serve society instead of what prevails currently of societies serving markets? Should finance capital (and

ism in South Asia, as indeed anywhere in the world, are enmeshed with many genuine concerns. First is that the movement is still India-centric and has not engaged enough with its South Asian neighbours. South Asia as a continent in itself has many bioregions that overlap between countries: coastal zones, deserts, islands, riverine deltas, mountains, flood plains and so on. An Indian can spend a lifetime in India itself with any one of these bioregions. However, the advantages of engaging across the border is manifold, especially in local knowledges and institutional practices

that not only can benefit neighbours but also India itself as it frees itself from its colonial extractive legacy. Nepal for instance has formalized local community management of resources (forests, drinking water, electricity etc.) that is but a dream in India (as late water secretary Ramaswamy Iyer remarked to me!).

For bioregionalism to succeed in making any headway in South Asia, education must be de-Macaulay-ized to give space to traditional and local knowledge more in tune with bioregional concerns. Democracy that has been hijacked by rapacious business interests must give way to Gandhian Gram Swaraj and traditional decentralized governance structures. Urban built environment that is not only expanding uncontrollably but is also rapaciously and unsustainably colonizing surrounding resources must be re-engineered as Cities as a Force for Good (and not for Bad! CFGs including Desakota regions of neither urban nor rural spaces.). These concepts must find expression in local languages, including people's understanding of issues such as climate change and biodiversity loss and what it means for their future.

In doing all of these things, if bioregionalism is to find traction and support in mass politics, they have to address immediate fundamental concerns and how they help solve them, concerns such as the inexorable damage



concomitant unlimited GDP growth) enjoy unquestioned divine rights of usury even at the expense of societal equity? Should development ("bikas") be unquestioningly worshipped even when it is mal-development and not apt-development ("ku-bikas and not "su-bikas") in much of actual practice today?

It is not a question of whether it can be done: it has to be done if humanity and much of life on earth is not to be extinguished. The question is how? First and foremost, new alliances have to be forged among like-minded and concerned folks, who certainly won't be in full

agreement but maybe only in 20 or 30% of the broader concerns. It will require new activism's networking skills across the region's myriad overlaps. It will also require a new philosophical approach to governance that values localization of production and consumption over globalized but fragile (as Covid and other conflicts have shown) value chains. In this, the idea of water and energy footprints and their reduction will have to play a key role in future environmental activism.

A very small beginning was made in Bhopal, a first step in a journey of a thousand kilometers. Which is why the word "satsang" was chosen in the title: it is a religious word ("gathering of truth seeking collegium") hijacked for common civic ends. The small gathering Bhopal was just such a meeting of "sat" seeking individuals that just need to expand their network and joint activism programs for the greater global good.

| dashain festival | **Festival of Unity**

As the Dashain festival draws near, a wave of activity sweeps across Nepal. Despite numerous transformations over the years, the allure of the festival remains intact. In addition to venerating Durga and the Goddess, individuals perceive the occasion as an opportunity for financial expenditure and shopping. From the less fortunate to the wealthy, everyone has their unique tastes. The festival asserts itself as a celebration for all.

s Dashain, the most significant and lengthy Hindu festival, approaches Nepali households, the ambiance has shifted noticeably, with individuals hastening to return home to partake in the festivities with their families. While various regions have distinct customs for celebrating Dashain or Navaratri, Nepal possesses its own unique

traditions. In the Kathmandu Valley and Newar communities across the nation, age-old practices continue to be observed. This is particularly noteworthy as they maintain the tradition of venerating the Shaktipith in accordance with established rituals. The festival in the Valley is distinctive. Unlike other areas of Nepal, the Dashain celebration in the Kathmandu Valley exhibits a unique character that is not found in many other regions. This period marks the height of worship dedicated to the Shaktipith. Nevertheless, Dashain is gradually evolving into a national celebration, embraced by all communities as a representation of unity. In various parts of the country, it is regarded as an occasion for

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family gatherings.

Numerous aspects of the Dashain festival are also observed in the southern plains of Nepal, known as Madhesh, where several significant Shaktipiths are located. The manner of celebrating Dashain in this region differs from that of the Valley.

Navaratri

Dashain commences concurrently with the onset of Navaratri. The inaugural day of Navaratri is marked by the worship and planting of jamara within households. The first day of Dashain is referred to as Ghatasthapana, which translates to the planting of a pot. On this day, a Kalash, a sacred vessel of water representing Goddess Durga, often adorned with her image, is positioned in the prayer area. The Kalash is filled with holy water and covered with cow dung, upon which seeds are sown. A small rectangular mound of sand is created, with the Kalash placed at its center.

The surrounding sand bed is also sown with grains. The Ghatasthapana ceremony is conducted at a specific auspicious time as determined by astrologers. At this precise moment, the priest recites

a greeting and invokes Goddess Durga to bless the vessel with her divine presence. Bv the tenth day, the seeds will have sprouted into five or six inches of vellow grass, known as jamara. During the final five days, this sacred grass is placed on the

heads of younger individuals by their elders while applying tika. The jamara serves as a symbol of both Goddess Durga and the blessings bestowed by the elders.

The ninth day is called Nawami: Temples of the mother goddess are filled with people from dawn to dusk. Animals, mostly black buffaloes, are slaughtered to honor Durga, the goddess of victory and power, and to seek her blessings. Military bands play war tunes, cannons boom, and officers with beautifully decorated medals stand in full uniform.

When the ceremony ends, the

courtyard is ankle-deep in blood. On this dav the god Vishwa Karma, the god of creativity, is also worshipped. All the factories, vehicles, all the machines and all the things that we live by are worshipped.

People also offer sacrifices to

venture near the Maitidevi temple during the day and everyone, except tantrics (shamans), invariably stay away from the place at night. Tirtha Man Bajracharya, the head priest of the temple, says, "The oldest structure was built in 628 AD by Amshu Verma, a warrior under the Lichhavi king Shiva Dev" - 13 centuries before Chandra Shamsher.


Sankata Temple

Sankata Temple is located in a crowded but quiet Tebahal

Kalikasthan

Devi is the great Goddess of the Hindus, the consort of Shiva, and is worshipped in various forms corresponding to her two aspects: benevolence and ferocity. She is Uma, 'light'; Gauri, 'yellow or brilliant'; Parvati, 'the mountaineer'; and Jagatmata, 'the mother of the world' in her milder form. Her terrible ema-



of goddesses - Bhadrakali, Shoall moving machines like cars, va Bhagawati, Manamaijudevi airplanes, trucks etc. to get the blessings of Goddess Durga for (Pachali), Guheshwari, Bangalaprotecting the vehicles and their mukhi, Chamunda (Shankhmul) occupants from accidents during and more in the capital during the year. The whole day is color-Dashain. And nine forms of Goddess

Durga - Shailaputri, Brahmach-Chandraghanta, arini. Kushmanda, Skandamata, Katyayini, Kaalratri, Mahagauri and Siddhidaatri - are worshipped for the nine days during this festival. The nine days of Durga Puja are called Navaratri.

In some parts of India, Dussehra is considered the focal point of the festival, making it effectively 10 days instead of 9. Additionally, since Navratri depends on the lunar calendar, in some years it may be celebrated for 8 days, with Dussehra on the 9th.

nations are Durga, 'the inaccessible'; Kali, 'the black'; Chandi, 'the fierce'; and Bhairavi, 'the terrible'.

Since 1900 on the Nepali calendar (1957 AD), the incarnation of Maha Shakti and the descendants of Shiv Kali's priests (pujaris) began with Harka Bahadur Shrestha (a Newar), who came from Thimi, near Bhaktapur. His only child, a girl named Krishna Kumari Shrestha, married a boy named Man Bahadur Khadka, a non-Newar. At present, their descendants are the chief priests of the temple.

Naxal Bhagwati

The temple of Naxal Bhagwati is located in the center of the Naxal township, close to Pashupatinath, Dillibazar and the Narayanhiti Museum. Situated at an intersection, the temple stands tall and distinct despite the encroachment of nearby shops, concrete buildings and busy traffic. It never fails to attract devotees who come in and out of the temple throughout the day. The features of Naxal Bhagwati are remarkably the same as other 'Devi' (Goddess) temples - its three tiered roof, two of which

Dakshinkali is located 18 km south of Ratnapark, Kathmandu. The ancient Kalika temple is located south of the capital, which some believe is why it was named Dakshinkali (dakshin means 'south' in Nepali). The Dakshinkali temple is dedicated to Kali, the fearsome form of Lord Siva's consort, Parvati,

The myth is that in the 17th century, an oracle in the form of a dream told King Pratap Malla to build a temple to the goddess. It was said that this would bring him prosperity and that no epidemic would befall his subjects. The

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Bhadrakali

According ancient to scriptures in the Vayu Purana and Mahabharata, Bhadrakali was created by the wrath of Devi when Daksha insulted Shiva during great Ashva-

medha Yagna (horse sacrifice). According to the Tantra Rahasya, she emerged from the northern (Uttaramnaya) face (Amnayas) of Shiva, which is blue in color and has three eyes.

It is believed that Bhadrakali was a local deity that was assimilated into mainstream Hinduism, especially Shaiva mythology. She sometimes assumes a terrifying aspect and is depicted with three eyes and four, 12, or 18 hands. She carries a number of weapons, with flames flowing from her head and a small tusk protruding from her mouth.



are copper plated, and carvings of other deities surrounding the temple.

Nardevi Temple


Despite a number of other temples in the locality, Nardevi is easily distinguishable. The three tired structure with one of the roofs plated in gold and its crafted pillars identify the Nardevi Mandir. According to historical data, the temple is believed to have been established in the 9th century AD by Gunakamadev, the founder of Kathmandu.

Dakshinkali

perfection, mostly emphasized on women, leading to prosperity and happiness. The name 'Shobha', in the same context, means 'brilliance' (derived from Sanskrit) or someone endowed with '32 lachin'. As the name suggests, Shobha Bhagwati is believed to be a goddess of perfection and brilliance.

Significance of Dashain

Dashain is one of the most important Hindu festivals that is celebrated with great joy all over Nepal. This festival usually falls in the month of Sep-



tember or October and is actually celebrated for 15 days.

It starts from the bright lunar fortnight (Shukla Paksha) and ends on the full moon day (Poornima) according to the Nepalese annual calendar. The greatest Hindu festival, Dashain honors a great conquest of the gods over the evil demons. The symbol of power, Goddess Durga is worshipped during this festival.

This festival is actually the ceremony of reunion and fun. People who live far away from their home or homeland, revisit their home and get together with their families. Similarly, parents buy new clothes for their children. People enjoy eating delicious food and playing many games, including cards. People invite guests, organize feasts, visit their relatives' houses, fly kites, build bamboo swings and engage in various entertaining activities.

Throughout Nepal, Goddess Durga is worshipped in all her manifestations with innumerable pujas, abundant offerings and thousands of animal sacrifices for the ritual holy bath, drenching the Goddess in blood for days. This year, the first day of the Dashain festival - Ghatasthapana - falls on October 3. The seventh day Pulpati is celebrated on October 5, followed by Asthami on October 6 and Nawami and Dashami on October 7 and 8 respectively. In addition, the festival continues for 5 more days till October 17, which is known as Kojagrat Purnima.

In preparation for Dashain, every home is cleaned and beautifully decorated, painted as an invitation to the Mother Goddess to visit and bless the house with good fortune. During this time, reunions of distant and near relatives take place in every household. The market is filled with shoppers looking for new clothes, gifts, luxuries, and huge supplies of temple offerings for the gods, as well as food for the family feast.

Thousands of sheep, goats, ducks, chickens and water buffalo are being prepared for the great slaughter. All kinds of organizations are closed for ten to fifteen days. Workers are hard to find; from the poor to the rich, everyone enjoys the festive mood. The aroma of 'Vijaya Dashami' is ev-

erywhere.

The festival celebrates the various victories of Hindu gods over demons, such as Lord Ram defeating Ravan in a duel and Goddess Durga defeating the buffalo demon Mahisasur, as well as many other demons. The festival as a whole is a celebration of the triumph of good over evil, and the stories are told throughout the ceremony to provide moral examples for the community.

Some of the activities during Dashain include fiesta-style parties, enjoying home-cooked meals, and flying kites to represent freedom. The festival usually coincides with the end of the monsoon season, and some locals believe that flying kites communicates with God to end the rainy season! People sacrifice a lot of animals during this festival, most of which are goats, sheep, chickens or buffaloes. However, the trend of sacrificing animals is changing to fruits and vegetables as the slaughter of animals is nowhere mentioned in the Hindu scriptures and the animal rights activists strongly condemn it. Some of the important days during Dashain are

Day 1 (Ghatasthapana)

Ghatasthapana is the first day of Bada Dashain. A male member of the family plants jamara (usually barley seeds) in moist sand. By the tenth day of the festival, the seeds will have grown into yellow grass, which is used with tika to bless people with prosperity and happiness.

Day 7 (Fulpati)

The special essence of the festival comes from this day. On this auspicious day, a military parade is organized at Hanuman Dhoka. Nepal Army, Nepal Po-



lice, Civil Service, Band Music and Panchebaja also join the Fulpati parade. People clean their houses and decorate their houses with flowers. Today (Oct. 19) is Fulpati and most of the celebrations in our homes will take place today! In our Dhading home, the children will fly kites, play on the traditional swing and end the day with a barbecue and a trip to the movies! The children from our Birgunj home will start the day with puja (prayers), followed by kite flying and a trip to the Parwanipur market where there will

be a huge fair!

Day 8 (Maha Ashtami)

The festivities continue as Maha Ashtami. Thousands of goats, sheep, buffaloes, ducks and chickens are sacrificed in the temple of the goddess from almost every house. In Newar community, Kuchi Bhoe is prepared in which ritually people should eat two pathi of beaten rice including various kinds of dishes in a banana leaf.

Day 9 (Maha Nawami)

The ninth day of the fes-



tival is known as Maha Nawami. On this day, the gates of the Taleju temple in Basantapur are opened to the public. Thousands of devotees go and pay obeisance to the Goddess throughout the day. This day is also known as Viswakarma Day.

Day 10 (Tika/Vijaya Dashami)

The tenth day of the festival is known as Vijaya Dashami or "Tika". On this auspicious day, tika and jamara (sewn on day 1) are taken from elders and blessings including "dakshin" (money) are received. These festivities continue for four days until the full moon rises. During this time, families and relatives who live apart meet and take blessings from the elders.

At a time when the country is facing several economic and political challenges, the festival also brings relief to all. The festival helps to revive the economy as people buy the goods.



The Japanese Ambassador to Nepal, Kikuta Yutaka, is known for his humility, gentleness, and eagerness to engage with individuals from various backgrounds. However, his initial one and a half years in Nepal were constrained by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Upon his arrival in Nepal during the challenging times of the COVID-19 pandemic, Ambassador Kikuta Yutaka, an experienced diplomat from Japan's Ministry of Foreign Affairs, encountered a situation where daily life had come to a halt and development initiatives were entirely suspended due to lockdown measures and other health protocols.

In the initial phase of his tenure, the ambassador's responsibilities were demanding, as he dedicated a significant portion of his time to distributing emergency medical supplies, including ventilators and oxygen machines, while also keeping his government informed about the dire health circumstances in Nepal.

Despite arriving in the midst of a significant global crisis, Ambassador Kikuta embraced and explored the rich culture, natural beauty, and vibrant lifestyle of Nepal. He conveyed his admiration for the country's diverse cultural heritage and landscapes.

In addition, Ambassador Kikuta's term has coincided with a significant moment to reflect on the Nepal-Japan student exchange program.

"Over the past two years, we regrettably had to halt nearly all forms of gatherings due to the Covid-19 pandemic, making this the first occasion for me to host such a large number of guests at my residence," the ambassador reflected during a celebration of the 120th anniversary on May 24, 2022 . The year 2022 commemorated the 120th anniversary of the Nepalese government's initiative to send eight young individuals to Japan for their studies, who arrived at Yokohama on June 17, 1902.

Over the past three and a half years, Ambassador Kikuta Yutaka, known for his gentle demeanor, has adeptly navigated the numerous challenges faced by Nepal.During these years he also monitored national and local elections, in the case of the national election in 2022, with the Japanese State Minister for Foreign Affairs Mr. TakeiShunsuke. 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RAHUGHAT HYDROPOWER PROJECT Nepal-India Hydropower Collaboration

With the outdated notion that India cannot import electricity from Nepal now dispelled, Kul Man Ghising, the Managing Director of the Nepal Electricity Authority (NEA), is committed to advancing the 40 MW Rahughat Hydropower Project. This endeavor, marking the third hydropower project supported by India, aims to bolster the partnership between Nepal and India in the hydropower domain over the next ten months of his second term. After the completion of the project, it will symbolize new milestone in Nepal-India Energy Partnership.

s the hydropower trade between Nepal and India reaches unprecedented levels with the export of electricity from Nepal, MD Kul Man Ghising has redirected his efforts towards the completion of the Rahughat hydropower project. This project is currently under construction with a concessional loan from the Exim Bank of India and is expected to be finalized within the last ten months of his tenure.

Having played a pivotal role in the development of Nepal's 19 MW Trishuli Hydropower Project, the largest project at the time in 1963, and the 11 MW Devighat Cascade Project in the 1980s, the successful completion of the 40 MW Rahughat Hydropower Project will mark another significant achievement in the partnership and cooperation between Nepal and India in the hydropower domain.

The project, which has faced delays spanning several decades, has now become a symbol of national pride. Recognizing its significance, MD Ghising, a figure renowned for his decisive action and dedication, has prioritized the advancement of this initiative. He appears fully prepared to allocate whatever time is necessary to ensure its success.

MD Ghising's connection to the project is also personal; he assumed the role of project manager in 2014 when it was nearly on the brink of failure. Due to unsatisfactory performance



from the contractors, MD Ghising made the decisive move to terminate the contract with the construction firm and subsequently redesigned the project, enhancing its capacity from 32 MW to 40 MW.

Despite encountering numerous challenges, the project has made significant strides. On September 19, an official holiday, MD Ghising made the journey to the project site, located 300 kilometers west of Kathmandu, to expedite the construction efforts.

Since the commencement of his first term, Managing Director Ghising has utilized official holidays to conduct inspections of various projects, providing guidance and essential support to project managers in order to address challenges. Throughout the final stages of construction, MD Ghising made regular visits to the 456 MW Upper Tamakoshi Project.

Construction Status

The 40 MW Rahughat Hydropower Project, which is being developed by Raghuganga Hydropower Ltd, a subsidiary of the Nepal Electricity Authority, has reached an 80 percent completion rate. The overall progress of the construction stands at 80 percent.

This project, located in the Raghugan-

ga Rural Municipality of Myagdi District, is expected to be completed by the following June, with financial assistance in the form of a concessional loan from the EXIM Bank of India to the Government of Nepal.

The concrete lining of the 6.2 km tunnel is currently progressing rapidly. Due to challenging geological conditions, the entire tunnel requires complete concrete lining. To date, one kilometer of the main tunnel has been successfully lined with concrete. Additionally, of the 1050 meters of the main tunnel designated to channel water to the powerhouse, a 130 mm pressure pipe has been installed.

Upon the completion of the primary civil structures of the power plant, the installation of turbines, generators, and other electromechanical equipment will commence. The facility will feature two units, each with a capacity of 20/20 MW for electricity generation.

The civil construction of the dam site has been finalized, and the necessary equipment, including the dam gate, has been delivered to the project location. Currently, approximately 30 percent of the sand thickening pond (decenter) construction has been accomplished. Work on the headworks, which had been halted due to inclement weather, is set to resume shortly.

MD Ghisingh, who also serves as the Chairman of the Raghuganga Hydropower Ltd. Managing Committee, conducted a site inspection and engaged with the project management team, consultants, and contractors involved in the construction process.

MD Ghisingh emphasized the need for a coordinated schedule to address the various challenges faced by the project, aiming for completion by June of the following year. Despite the challenges posed by the difficult geographical conditions, the Covid-19 pandemic, and seismic events, the project has made significant progress towards completion through persistent efforts.



"Given the ongoing interest from all stakeholders in the project's completion, we must exert our final efforts to ensure its conclusion within the current fiscal year and expedite the work. We will provide the necessary resources to facilitate this," stated Managing Director Ghising. "We should finalize the construction timeline within a week to ensure completion by June, with all parties signing off to proceed accordingly. As the concrete lining work presents a challenge, it is advisable to accelerate construction by increasing the workforce."

Due to the project's immobility from the site specified in the approved Initial Environmental Assessment (IEE) report, it became necessary to relocate stones because of a shortage of sand and gravel. An interim order was issued by the single bench of the then Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Cholendra Shamsher Rana, on 29 Asar 2078, prohibiting any diversion of the river's natural course until a final decision was reached regarding the writ, as the Kaligandaki river holds significant religious, historical, and ecological value.

Raghuganga Hydropower Limited (RGHPL) was founded in March 2017 with the aim of generating 40 MW of electricity in the Gandaki Province of Myagdi District, Nepal. The project is wholly owned by the Nepal Electricity Authority (NEA). Funding for this initiative has been secured through a soft loan from the EXIM Bank of India.

The plant is expected to produce an annual energy output of approximately 247.89 GWh, with 137.71 GWh classified as firm energy in a year with 90% reliability. It has the capacity to generate peak power during the dry season for a duration of six hours at its maximum installed capacity. The project will yield around 247.9 million units of electricity each year, which can be dispatched for four hours each day.

Electricity generated by the Raghuganga Hydroelectric Project will be transmitted via a 0.6 km long 220 kV double circuit transmission line, linking the RGHEP Power House switchyard to the Dana Kushma line as part of the Dana Kushma 220 kV Transmission Line Project.

Upon completion of the project by June of the following year, it will represent a significant achievement in Nepal-India collaboration and partnership within the hydropower sector. The recent site visit by MD Ghising and the issuance of directives are noteworthy developments in this context.

MIDDLE BHOTEKOSHI

Final Stage

Following the inspection conducted by State Minister for Energy, Water Resources, and Irrigation Purna Bahadur Taman, along with NEA Managing Director Kul Man Ghising, efforts to expedite the transmission line construction are underway, with the aim of completing the 102 MW Middle Bhotekoshi project within a month.


Just two weeks prior, an agreement was reached to commence the construction of the 220 kV transmission line essential for transmitting electricity generated by the Middle Bhotekoshi Hydropower to the Barahabise Substation. On the morning of September 21, Minister of State for Energy, Water Resources, and Irrigation Purna Bahadur Taman, accompanied by NEA Managing Director Kul Man Ghising, visited the construction site to assess progress.

With extensive experience in the construction industry, State Minister Taman is adept at addressing the concerns of local communities and contractors. Consequently, he chose to inspect the site alongside Managing Director Ghising. During their visit, they instructed the project management team, consultants, and construction personnel to ensure that electricity generation is achieved within the next month.

MD Ghisin has dedicated nearly all of his public holidays, including Saturdays, to overseeing construction sites. This week, he was joined by Minister Tamang.

The 102 MW Middle Bhotekoshi Hydropower Project, which has faced nearly a year of delays due to local opposition regarding the installation of the conductor for the 220 kV transmission line, is now poised to commence electricity generation within a month.

Following a consensus reached with local residents concerning the construction of a two-kilometer transmis-





sion line from the project's switchyard in Bahrbise Municipality-5 to the NEA's Bahrbise Substation in District 3, the wire installation process has commenced. The work on the 220 kV single circuit transmission line is expected to be finalized before the Dashain festival.

The local opposition was resolved after an agreement was signed on September 13, in the presence of several officials, including Minister of Power, Water Resources and Irrigation Deepak Khadka, Minister of State Purna Bahadur Tamang, Federal Member of Parliament for Sindhupalchok-2 Mohan Bahadur Basnet, Joint Secretary of the Ministry Sandeep Kumar Dev, NEA Managing Director Kulman Ghising, Head of Bahrbise Municipality Balkrishna Basnet, Ward Presidents, Assistant Chief District Officer, and the President of the Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

The resumption of construction on the transmission line, which had been on hold for approximately 14 months, is now underway due to this agreement. The project, overseen by Chilime Jalvidyut Company Limited, a subsidiary of the Nepal Electricity Authority (NEA), is in the final phase of the 102 MW Middle Bhotekoshi Hydropower Project, which is anticipated to commence electricity generation within a month.

During his visit, State Minister Tamang urged the contractors to accelerate the remaining tasks and ensure that all project management personnel remain on-site until completion. Once the Middle Bhotekoshi hydropower project begins producing electricity, the Bahrbise substation, constructed by NEA, will also be energized with this power. The Barabishe 220-132 kV substations were completed last year.

In light of ongoing obstructions, NEA has implemented a alternatemporary tive solution for the evacuation of electricity from Middle Bhotekoshi. The electricity transmitted to the Bahrbise substation via the 220 kV transmission lines will be stepped down to 132 kV at the substation and subsequently delivered to the national grid through the 132 kV transmission line.

To facilitate this, the company is currently working on utilizing

the 132 kV transmission line established by Shivashree Hydropower, the developer of the 22 MW Upper Chaku A Hydropower Project, to connect to the Bahrbise Substation.

The project is nearing completion. Following the construction of the dam, water has been released for testing purposes. The main tunnel, measuring 7,124 meters in length, has been completed. Although the water filling test commenced in February of the previous year, experts identified water leakage in approximately 1,400 meters of the main tunnel. After the necessary repairs and enhancements are finalized, the tunnel will undergo further testing. Currently, the cleaning process of the tunnel is underway, and it is scheduled to be filled with water in 15 days.

The civil construction work at the power plant has been finalized, and the installation and testing of the electromechanical equipment (dry test) are nearing completion. Once water is discharged from the tunnel, the wet testing of the equipment will commence.



All outstanding tasks are expected to be completed within one month, with the objective of initiating power generation.

The construction of the Middle Bhotekoshi project faced several challenges, including the Jure landslide, a significant earthquake, disputes along the Nepal-India border, flooding of the Bhotekoshi River, the impact of Covid-19, and subpar performance by contractors.

The projected cost of the project was initially estimated at Rs. 12 billion, excluding interest during the construction phase, at the time the loan agreement was established with the Employees' Provident Fund. The revised estimated cost of the project, also excluding interest for the construction period, is now Rs. 16 billion. The original total cost of the project was financed equally, with 50 percent sourced from equity and 50 percent from debt.

Among the founding shareholders, who collectively hold 51 percent of the company's issued capital, the distribution includes 10 percent from the NEA, 37 percent from Chilime Jalvidyut Company Limited, and 1 percent each from Sindhupalchok Hydropower Co. Ltd., Nepal Arnico Hydropower Company Ltd., Sindhu Investment Company Pvt. Ltd., and Sindhu Bhotekoshi Hydropower Ltd.

The remaining 49 percent is held by ordinary shareholders, which includes 19.5 percent from employees of the Provident Fund, 3.5 percent from employees of the founding organizations, 1 percent from employees of the lending organizations, 10 percent from residents of Sindhupalchok, and 15 percent from the general public.

The company has successfully raised capital through the issuance of ordinary shares. The project is expected to produce 542 million units of electricity annually. The NEA will purchase electricity generated by the project during the winter and rainy seasons at rates of Rs. 8.40 and Rs. 4.80 per unit, respectively. The company anticipates an annual revenue of Rs. 2.08 billion.

Our companies, Equipped with world-class expertise, are ready and willing to take part in more projects and




improve capacity-building initiatives in Nepal. With each successful project, we further solidify the trust and partnership that our two countries have built over the past five decades.

Improve Quality Of Distribution

Construction of 220 kV Udipur Substation Completed

nder the Masryangdi Corridor 220 kV transmission line project, the construction of a 220 kV substation has been completed at Udipur in Benisahar Municipality of Lamjung.

Udipur substation based on Gas Insulated Substation (GIS) technology has 220-132 kV, 160 MVA and 132-33 kV, 50 MVA power transformers.

The construction of the substation has been completed and all the equipment

including the power transformer has been successfully tested. 132 kV substation has been brought into operation.

According to the electricity purchase and sale agreement between Nepal Electricity Authority (NEA) and Himalayan Power Partner, the power of 27 MW Dordi Khola hydropower project is connected to this substation.

The Dordi Corridor 132 kV double circuit transmission line constructed for the electricity generated from Lamjung's Dordi and its trib-

utaries will now be connected to this substation.

As the construction of Udipur substation seemed to take some time, the electricity coming from the Dordikhola hydropower and Dordi Corridor transmission line was bypassed to the Udipur substation and connected to the switchyard of Middle Marsyangdi power plant through an alternative arrangement.

As the construction of the substation has been completed, now the Dordi Corridor transmission line will be inserted into this substation and electricity will be transferred to the switchyard of Middle Marsyangdi. After that, electricity will flow to the national transmission system through Middle Masyangdi-Masryangdi 132 kV transmission line.

Managing Director of the NEA Kulman Ghising said that since electricity will be supplied locally through the 33 kV line from Udipur substation, the electricity supply in that area will be reliable and trustworthy.

Managing Director Ghisingh said, "Under the project, the construction of 220 kV transmission line from Udipur via Tanahun's Markichoke to Chitwan's Bharatpur is being completed



by the end of April."

After the construction of this line, it will be more convenient for the electricity produced by the hydropower projects in that area, so the construction of this line has been given high priority and the work has been carried forward.

The Masryangdi Corridor 220 kV transmission line project has been started for the electricity generated from Masryangdi and its tributaries to flow into the national transmission system.

About 1,600 MW of electricity can be transmitted through the transmission line. Under the project, a 113 km double circuit transmission line from Bharatpur in Chitwan to Dharapani in Manang is under construction. The project is being divided into three packages. Under the first package, about 67 km transmission line from Udipur to New Bharatpur substation is under construction.

Out of the 110 towers in the Udipur-Markichoke section of this package, 90 foundations have been laid. Out of 83 towers in Markichoke Bharatpur section, 35 towers on private land have been laid.

As the rest of the tower is located in the forest area, the project head Narayan Regmi said that they are going to start felling the trees after the completion of the whole to use the land of the forest area and remove the trees there.

Under the project, 69hectares of national forest will be used and 10,225 trees will have to be cut for the construction of the transmission line from Udipur in Lamjung to New Bharatpur via Gorkha, Tanahun.

Under the second package, the construction of new Bharatpur and Udipur substations has been completed.

Under the third package, Manang (Dharapani)-Khudi-Udipur 46 km transmission line and two substations are under construction. Construction of 220÷132÷33 kV Khudi substation is almost 90 percent complete. 220÷132÷33 Manang substation is also under construction.

The foundations of 22 of the 46 towers in the Khudi-Udipur transmission line section have been laid. 6 towers have been erected.

The estimated cost of the project under construction is around 16 billion rupees with the investment of the Nepal government and the concessional loan of the European Investment Bank (EIB).
